We welcome our new businesses and encourage you to stop by and visit them once opened. Huntington Physical Therapy, 1733 Midland Trail,





Below is the latest update on the various Hoops Family projects:

- Building adjacent to the bank building has been completely remodeled and Active Medical expects to open its showroom, warehouse and office billing by early May that will initially employ 17 people.
- Demolition of the bank building is approximately 75% complete with plans to start remodeling and construction into a new restaurant with a broad menu and a number of 3<sup>rd</sup> story private meeting rooms for dinners and business clientele.
- The Grand Patrician is expected to be under roof by the end of May, with plumbing and electrical work starting in the next few weeks

The Flood Wall Project is moving forward with continued communications with the Corp of Engineers, representatives from other branches of State government as well as with the Governor's Office. This means savings due to "no flood insurance" and allows for major improvements to structures in these areas.

## From the Director of Public Works Charlie Conard

The new water line on Glenwood Avenue is 90% complete.



They are still working on the curbs and both are looking great. The sidewalk replacement is 50% complete and looks great as well. So far the only surprise we have experienced on this project is finding a 4" water line down the middle of the

street and then locating what it is connected to and determining if it is used and needed.

The weather has been much more cooperative on the Glenwood project than on the Adams Avenue project. Thanks to all the residents and travelers for all their patience while your life is interrupted by route changes, loss of parking, missed deliveries and many other issues. Thank you and hang in there, It will be worth it in the long run.

We will continue our paving project throughout the City. We recently paved Taylor Street, Meadow Lane and part of Mockingbird. Remember we can't do them all at once but eventually we will get your street.

The Sewer Project is moving along, slowly. We have been having monthly conference calls with the USDA, attorneys, engineers, etc., getting all the plans, permits, studies and other paper work complete. It will still be a while before actual work begins to replace the very old and add some new sewer lines.

A problem we need our residents to work on before the next "Cleanup" in the fall. Your junk items need to be out by Monday, the first day of the clean up, please do not put items out

after that. Some of you put items out 3 or 4 different days. We should have everything picked up before the last day. Remember the limits is (1) one pickup truckload per house. This recent spring cleanup we had to return to some locations several trips, that is not how this works. In the future please respect our workers and follow this rule.

## From the Utilities Office

Happy Spring! Spring brings showers, flowers and glimpses of summer. However, winter's freeze and spring's thaw can damage water pipes and cause leaks and water line breaks. The Utilities Department has kept busy repairing such problems, and many of our customers have experienced these troubles as well. As time has allowed, Terry, Timmy, Carl and Tom, your utility workers, have worked tirelessly to beautify areas disturbed by current and previous repairs. Thanks, fellas! We appreciate your hard work!

It is also time to begin thinking about pool maintenance and filling. We accept one request per year per household for utility bill adjustments for pool fills. The pool fill adjustment forms are available in our office, as well as on our website. After you have filled your pool, please remit a completed form to us. All requests will be reviewed at the September Utilities meeting. If approved, bills will be adjusted after that time, and will appear as a credit on the account. Customers are expected to pay their utility bills in full by the due date. If a payment arrangement is needed, please come to the office to set up a deferred payment agreement.

## Code Enforcer/Building Inspector Mike Ramsey



With the nice weather comes projects. Lots of projects require hiring professionals. Which is my focus in this article. First, let me say there are wonderful, reliable contractors who work in the City of Milton, but the rest of my article refers to the few bad apples.

I cannot stress enough that you need to do your homework and research those you are considering for a job. There have been instances in the last few months where a homeowner has been "duped".

A little research and/or a phone call can save you money and lots of stress. It is important that ALL I contractors be licensed and insured with the State as well as the City. A simple call to my office will let you know if they have a City license and in good standing. NEVER pay for a job before it is complete. Dishonest, shady contractors will take the money and run. Yes, this does happen.



If you become a victim, you can expect a headache. You have to contact the Division of Labor, who may investigate the incident and you have to file a complaint with the WV Attorney General's Office, both can take a lot of time. Quite often you will be out whatever money you already spent and still have an incomplete project to deal with, which will cost you twice as much.

Also, be observant about building permits. Most contractors build a fee for the building permit into your estimate. This does not mean they obtain a permit. There have been instances where the contractor pockets this money. A permit is required to be visibly displayed on the



work site, such as front door or a window. If a permit is required and has not been purchased a Stop Work Order will be issued regardless of what stage of work the project is in. It is YOUR responsibility as the homeowner to assure a permit is issued. Always ask to see it and if you are told one is not required you

can call me to verify this.

Part of my job is to check on contractors at the site to ensure they are following the rules and you are getting done what you hired them to do.

I can't be everywhere and some of them do slide through the crack. So again, take time to check them out to prevent becoming a victim. As always if you have questions please give me a call at (304)743-3032, extension 202.

Finally, we are back up to full strength. With the recent hiring of Matthew Newcome from Kenova Police Department we are again at nine full time and two part-time officers. Matt comes to us after two years of experience with Kenova PD and will be joining the midnight shift. We welcome Matt to the Milton PD and hope he enjoys working here.

As the weather warms up more and more kids are out playing and riding bikes. Please be careful as you drive the residential areas and along US Route 60 and watch for those young'uns.

I will remind everyone again that if you need a Milton police officer please CALL 911, even if it's not an emergency. The 911 center dispatches for all law enforcement agencies in the county. We have a police clerk in the office Monday—Friday from 8-4 but she has no dispatch radio and would have to call 911 to dispatch an officer. Cut out the middle man and call 911 direct. We get way too many people contacting us via Facebook which is NOT monitored 24 hours a day. Also, call while the incident is going on. We can't do a lot when you call about something that happened a couple days ago.

School will be out soon and vacation season will be wide open. If you are going out of town, call our office and get put on the vacation watch list so we can give your home a little extra attention while you're gone.

Our brothers at Hurricane PD are experiencing some rough times, first with the shooting of Sgt. Phillip Armentrout (who is recovering slowly) and most recently with the open heart surgery of Chief Mike Mullins, who is also recovering but keep both in your prayers please. I can well attest to the power and benefit of those prayers to a full recovery and thank each of you who prayed during my own open heart surgery last May.

We have received our new drug dog although it is not the dog we initially thought we were getting. Instead of an English Pointer we received a female Belgian Malinois named Debbie. She is extremely friendly and has a tremendous hunt drive and is fully trained on her various drug scents. Again, this dog

was donated to us by Makor K-9 and owner Jay Kerr and we thank him profusely as these types of dogs generally cost thousands of dollars. K-9 Patrolman Dallas Scarberry is Debbie's handler (I know) and if you see him out ask him to meet Debbie. Of course, Sgt. Albert Collins still has his dog Joe and will be working the evening shift while Dallas works days. Having a dog available in town is a great tool

for our drug enforcement efforts.

## **Memorial Service at the Milton Cemetery**

## Confederate Memorial Day Service, Milton West Virginia

On Saturday April 20, 2019, the United Daughters of the Confederacy (UDC), chapter Cooney Ricketts, 2726, in collaboration with the Sons of Confederate Veterans, (SCV) camp A. G. Jenkins #628, held a combined Memorial Service for the Confederate and Union soldiers buried in the town cemetery at Milton, WV.

In preparation for the service, several members of the Cooney Ricketts UDC chapter (*i.e. Marilyn Coleman, Jean Hatfield, Roberta Casey, Ethel Elkins, Renee' Spence and Billie Johnson*), expended many hours over several days cleaning the neglected Confederate and Union tombstones. This involved scraping off lichens, brushing, and applying an anti-biological agent to aid the rain and wind in naturally further cleaning the stones over time.

By the day of the event, the old Soldier's gravestones visually stood-out brighter from the other stones surrounding them. One of those Soldier's stones was chance situated on a raised and flat area in the middle of the cemetery, co-located with a permanent wooden cross. We chose that site as the central platform for the ceremony. The UDC chapter placed small, period-correct United States and First National Confederate flags at the foot of the wooden cross. The SCV camp erected larger flags on the flanks of the speaking area.

The services included an invocation, proclamation of purpose, a poem and a song. The Honorable Tom Canterbury, mayor of Milton, WV, was the keynote speaker. Following a solemn roll-call of the names of the fifteen known Union and Confederate soldiers buried in the cemetery, a seven-man SCV rifle and pistol detail performed a 21-gun salute to the honored dead. This was followed by a benediction and the twenty-minute service was concluded.

This memorial service was done in the spirit of the very first Confederate Memorial service that was performed one hundred and fifty-three years ago, in the year 1866,

by the Ladies Memorial Association of Columbus, Georgia, where they decided to set aside one day annually to memorialize the Confederate war dead. We, as the organized decedents of those brave and honorable men, were proud to continue this tradition in our local area. Nothing is ended until it is forgotten.

## Floodplain & Stormwater News by Randy Rutledge

**Stormwater News**—Grass cutting season is back! By now, everyone has cut their grass at least once. Here are a few things to remember:

Set your grass cutting height to 3 or 31/2. This height is the healthiest for the grass and allows grass to grow and crowd out the weeds. Cutting your grass shorter than this is harmful to the grass, which allows the weeds to grow better and means you want to cut your grass more often. The shorter it's cut the faster it grows.

If you are buying a new lawnmower, please consider a mulching one. A mulching lawnmower will greatly reduce or eliminate grass clippings you must clean up. State regulations no longer allow grass clippings to be in the street and we also have an ordinance prohibiting it. Please keep your grass clippings out of the street. Remem-



ber, "Only Rain Down the Drain!" Mulching lawnmowers are a little bit more expensive initially but can save money in the long run as you probably won't have to buy lawn fertilizer anymore.

Consider doing a soil test before buying fertilizer this year. That way you will know exactly what your lawn may be lacking and buy only that type of fertilizer which will save money. The WVU Soil Testing Laboratory conducts soil tests free for West Virginia residents. For more information, contact WVU Extension specialist Jeffrey Skousen at 304-293-2667 or go to <a href="https://extension.wvu.edu/natural-resources/soil-water/soil-testing">https://extension.wvu.edu/natural-resources/soil-water/soil-testing</a>. Many studies have shown we tend to apply a lot more fertilizer than needed which wastes money and may harm your lawn. The excess will run off during storms and enter the storm drains and end up polluting the river.

Floodplain News—As you have read elsewhere in this newsletter it



looks like Milton will be getting a levy and flood-wall system. In a nutshell, a large section of our city is in the floodplain. This levy will protect most of this area which will remove the restrictions imposed due to the floodplain. It will also mean you don't have to have flood insurance. It's still a good idea to carry it but the cost

will drop dramatically.

This levy comes at a great time as FEMA is planning on making several changes to the National Flood Insurance Program, many due to climate change. The first two strategies are:

"Encourage long-term migration away from coastal areas and floodplains through a national 'discounts for buyouts' program that would offer homeowners discounts on their flood insurance premiums now in exchange for a commitment to accept a future buyout once their home is substantially damaged by flooding. "

"Expedite bringing vulnerable properties into compliance with floodplain development requirements that decease the potential for flood damage by community adoption of a cumulative and/or lower threshold 'substantial damage' or substantial improvement' standard." The current threshold is 50%. The one proposed is 25%.

Taken together this means you would, assuming you have a house worth \$100,000 in market value, voluntarily agree to sell to FEMA after sustaining flood damage over \$25,000. This is quite a change.

## **History of West Virginia Day**

During the Civil War, the Virginia General Assembly in Richmond chose to ioin the Confederate States of America, much to the chagrin of most of the inhabitants in the trans-Allegheny region of the state who had long expressed their resentment toward the political elites in Richmond. Loyal unionists gradually pushed for the creation of a new state. After two years of legal maneuvering, West Virginia was formally admitted to the United States of America on June 20, 1863. June 20 had been informally celebrated across West Virginia over the next six decades until the WV Legislature gave the holiday formal recognition in 1927.
