From the Mayor

Senators Joe Manchin and Shelley Moore Capito both visited Milton in March with the announcement that additional funds had been secured for the Milton Flood Wall. Construction of the flood wall is still a few years away, however. I have expressed my concerns to both Senators about the delay and the possibility of once again having insufficient funds to complete the flood wall. The United States Army Corps of Engineers is considering a few design changes to lessen the impact on areas outside of the floodwall. They continue to work hard on this project, and I am cautiously hopeful that this floodwall project will remain on track and will be completed as quickly as possible. The USACE plans to hold Open Office Hours at City Hall on May 3 and 4, 2023 from 3-7pm.



While Senator Manchin was in Milton, he presented City Council Member Bob Legg with a Flag of the United States of America in honor of Bob's 68 years of service to the Milton Volunteer Fire Department. Thank you, Bob, for your many years of dedicated service!

As you know, West Virginia American Water Company recently made an offer to purchase the Milton Utilities. After WVAW presented their offer, the City held an informational and public input meeting at the Milton Volunteer Fire Department to hear what Milton Utilities' customers had to say about this issue. The City's CPA, Rod Lowe, thoroughly presented information on the Milton Utilities' financials, various loans and grants for past and current projects, and provided a rate comparison. Dakota Miller, who is both a City Council Member and a Utility Board Member, gave an overview of the water and sewer systems and outlined the steps the City is taking to ensure that its customers are receiving quality water. He did an excellent job outlining the array of projects that have been completed, as well as the current and upcoming projects.

We appreciate all the Milton Utilities customers who attended the meeting on April 10th and provided their input on this important matter. Your responses are important to us, and we will use your

Spring and Summer are busy times. Many activities that are put on hold during cold, winter months have been revived including mowing and paving, both of which have begun in earnest. Some of the paving projects you should see soon include all or portions of North Main Street, Mason Street, Rays Way, Short Street and Kane Street.

Spring clean-up during the last week of April relieved City residents of many tons of items in need of disposal. We are happy to be able to provide this service for those in City limits. It not only helps our residents, it beautifies our streets and neighborhoods.



On April 10th we held a public meeting to provide information to Milton Utilities customers, and to

hear their views on West Virginia American Water Company's offer to purchase the Milton Utilities. Thanks to everyone who came out for this meeting and shared their opinions on this important issue.

Both the Sewer Project and the Newman's Branch Project are going strong. Some smaller projects have been completed, including the replacement of waterlines along a few hundred feet of McGhee Street. Other projects are still in the planning stages. I encourage you to attend the Utility Board meetings to get more information on current and upcoming endeavors.

Required hydrant flow testing has been completed for the year. We realize this is an inconvenience as it stirs up sediment in the water lines, but it is important to make sure that fire hydrants are in proper working order. We appreciate your patience.

Spring has sprung and warm Summer temperatures are quickly approaching! For those of you with swimming pools or those who plan to purchase a pool this summer, here is an explanation of our Pool Adjustment Policy. Of course,



when you decide to fill your pool is completely up to you, but keep in mind that a pool adjustment will only be given for **one billing cycle** and will only be given **once per calendar year.** Meters are typically read on the 17th of each month, which is something you may consider when planning your pool fill so that you get the most benefit from your adjustment. The pool adjustment form can be found on our website under the utilities tab or may be picked up at our office. Please be aware that submission of this form does not relieve responsibility of payment, and that those forms will be reviewed in September at our Water Board meeting. Adjustments granted will be reflected on the bill you receive in October.

Milton Utilities offers a wide variety of convenient payment options. Payments can be made online 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by visiting www.cityofmiltonwv.com or by calling 1-877-739-6281. You may choose to pay by mail using a check or money order, pay in person at our office using cash, check, money order or credit/debit card, or you can contact the office about signing up for ACH. Upon completion of an ACH form, your

payment will automatically draft from your checking account on the 15th of each month. Payments may also be made after hours using our drop box which is located under our drive-thru window. We ask that you only deposit check or money order payments in the drop box. **Please do not drop cash.** We recommend that you include your bill payment stub to ensure proper credit and using an envelope to keep your items together.

With the recent hire of Ian Galloway we are fully staffed again and ready for the summer.







Long Grass Code Reminder

Spring is here! Be sure to remember our ordinance for weeds - International Property Maintenance Code §302.4 - when maintaining your lawns!

Premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of 12 Inches. Noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants, and vegetation, other than trees or 🌃 shrubs provided, however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens. Any person who violates a provision of this code, or fails to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be prosecuted within the limits provided by state or local laws. Each day that a violation continues after due notice has been served shall be deemed a separate offense, and subject to a fine of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$500.00 per violation.

1800an "I can't cut the grass until I find the lawnmower, and I can't find the lawnmower until I cut the grass!'

Be aware that City Council will be considering a change to this Ordinance, lowering the permissible height of grasses/weeds/plant growth to 9 Inches.

United Daughters of the Confederacy Cooney Ricketts #2726 Milton

Cooney Ricketts #2726 of the United Daughters of the Confederacy held its regular monthly meeting on Saturday, April 9 at Shonet's in Milton. We discussed Confederate History Month and the importance of remembering and teaching all our nation's history. Consequently, our program, which was delivered by Chapter President, Billie Johnson, concerned the legend of Abner Vance, which is rooted in the folklore of the Hatfield's and McCoy's feud. How factual it is, is anyone's guess, but this story has persisted for over 200 years.

In the early nineteenth century, Abner Vance lived in the Clinch River Valley near Abingdon, Virginia. He was a Baptist Preacher in what was referred to as "Regular" or "Hardshell" Baptists of the time. Abner was a man of quiet disposition and strong devotion to his family, and he had a daughter by the name of Betty, who was the "apple of his eye." Living in those same parts was a good -looking young doctor by the name of Daniel Horton. Daniel was quite a "ladies' man" and he set "his cap" for young Betty, convincing her that he would marry her if she would run away with him to Baltimore. Well, she did just that. But, instead of marrying her as he had promised, he had "his way" with her and, when he tired of her in about two weeks, returned her to her father's home.

Standing, back row L-R Mary Johnson, Dee McComas, The Vance family was sitting at the dinner table when Daniel Horton and Betty Elizabeth Swaine, Sue Thornton, Ethel Elkins, Bertie showed up at Abner's house. Horton called the father's attention to his Casey, Easter Miller. Middle row L-R Ada Martin, Donna daughter's return using some of the crudest, vulgar language ever used by a Stephens, Bobbi Young. Sitting L-R Marilyn Coleman, seducer to a father about his daughter. After dumping Betty unceremoniously in the front yard, he remounted his horse and rode away with the parting phrase akin to something like, "Here's your heifer back."

Abner Vance was so enraged by this man's actions that he grabbed his shotgun and set off in pursuit, catching up with him at the banks of the Clinch River. While Daniel Horton was stopped giving his horse a chance to rest and drink, Abner Vance shot him in the back of the head, and he fell off his horse near the bank on the other side. Later, Daniel's brother found and retrieved his body. Today, that ford across the Clinch River is still known as Horton Ford.

When Abner Vance realized what he had done, he panicked and fled from his home, becoming a fugitive from the law. In his 2 years of isolation from his family, and wandering the regions north of his home, Abner acquired several tracks of land consisting of thousands of acres along the Tug River on the Kentucky-Virginia border, and along the Guyandotte River and Twelve Pole Creek in what is now Logan and Mingo Counties. These areas are the ancestral homelands of the Vance, Hatfield, and many McCoy clans. After years on the run, the loneliness and isolation from his family caused Abner Vance to return to his home. He felt no guilt over what he had done and even felt justified in the eyes of the Lord, so he reasoned that even if he returned and was tried, he would surely be exonerated. That did not happen. He was tried, found guilty of murder, and duly executed. While awaiting execution, he composed a song known as "Abner Vance's Farewell Song" which he is reported to have sung on the day of his execution. In addition to singing his song, he preached for over two hours, captivating the crowd who had gathered to see him hanged.

Ironically, shortly after his public hanging, a delayed message arrived from the Governor granting Abner Vance a pardon. So, what connection does this story have with the legendary Hatfield's and McCoy's? Abner Vance was the father of Betty Vance. Betty Vance became the mother of Nancy Vance. And Nancy Vance was the mother of William Anderson "Devil Anse" Hatfield, related President Billie Johnson, who is a descendent of the Vance clan.
