Last year was a great year for the City of Milton and we anticipate this year being even greater as we continue with our many projects that will only improve the City. Those projects are:

- **Floodwall**—the preliminary work projects such as soil testing, surveying, etc. has begun. You should see some actual construction later this year.
- **2018 Sewer Project**—it has taken over a year to get all the paperwork completed and approved for the permits, grants and loans. You should see some actual construction this year as well.
- **Street Paving, Sidewalk & Curbing**—several projects have been completed. The curbing and sidewalks on Hallison Circle should begin this month. Several factors go in to planning these projects. First, finding a contractor who is willing to work and can get the job done; second we have to have available funds. (Remember the Home Rule funds are received quarterly.)
- **Water Plant**—we have completed several improvements. However, it is never too soon to look into building a new, more modern plant. Grant research and applications are time consuming.
- **New Water Lines**—as leaks occur and we discover old, dilapidated lines, we are adding to our list to get new lines installed.
- **Maintenance Garage & Storage Building**—this is much needed and is possible through funds accumulated by any sales relating to the Morris Memorial property.

Above are just a few of the major projects; there are small projects and day to day jobs going on all the time. Some project work is contracted out but the rest is completed by our employees. We have the best employees in our street, water, sewer, electrical, stormwater, building, cemetery, police and office staff.

I hope you have a safe, Happy New Year. It is hard to believe we are in the year 2020. Below are some projects we will be working on this year.

We will continue with our paving projects which include sidewalks and curbing. Our next project is Hallison Circle and we expect the curbing and sidewalks to begin on January 6, 2020. Although there are not as many residents located in this area, it will still create headaches and inconveniences, but will be great when completed. Paving will start in the spring when the blacktop factories are open. Residents - please be patient.

If you own a business and use large trucks, please be aware that large trucks ruin our pavement. Please consider using a smaller truck to preserve the life of our roads

We will be replacing water lines on McGhee Street and Rear Florida Street. These are some of those old lines which are in desperate need of replacement.

One project we are working on, which will be ongoing as time allows, is cutting and chipping brush to open the view at the Milton Little League ballfield. This property has been annexed into the City Limits at the request of the Little League in an effort to stop vandalism and destruction of this area. Our police can now patrol the area, and once the hillside is cleared, the fields will be very visible. Be sure to report any unusual activity in the area.



During inclement weather, our snow schedule remains the same as in the past. We treat hills first, then intersections, then main streets, then alleys, backroads and sidewalks. Our guys head out in the middle of the night or whenever they are needed after they are contacted by our Police Department. They work long hours to keep our city safe for travel during these times. Please be patient.

The grant was submitted with all materials needed before the deadline. On to a little tech information. I want to emphasize the importance of computer and smartphone backups. No matter what kind you have, these devices could



be lost or stolen, and are vulnerable to attacks or just simple failures! Most people have all of their digital photos and documents on one device, and if something happens, everything is lost. It is very important to back up those images to an external hard drive or a cloud type service. Some services are even included with subscriptions you may already have. The last thing anyone wants is to lose the only digital copies of pictures that can never be retaken. Take a minute and make sure you have them backed up and it will save some heartache in the future.

Code Enforcer/Building Inspector Mike Ramsey

It's hard to believe that winter is here but we cannot deny the cold weather. With winter weather comes all types of issues with our homes. There are always the dreaded frozen water pipes, the battle to keep warm, possible power outages and the list goes on.

Let me start with frozen water pipes. There are several things you can do to prevent this. A simple and cost-effective solution is wrapping your pipes with pre-cut pipe foam wrap. This is a straightforward project that most can handle on their own. You can also line the crawl space around your house with plastic or a foam board. While your exterior walls to your house may be sealed well from the elements, your foundation may not be. Small cracks or holes can form which will speed up the freezing process. A simple thing we sometimes overlook is remembering to disconnect your garden hose from the outdoor spigot. Another approach is heat tape which is wrapped around the spigot pipe and plugged in to an electrical source creating the heat.

Since we have mentioned electrical, let's not forget, electrical and fire safety go hand in hand. Many homes in Milton are older and must use space heaters in addition to the main heat source. These heaters are fine as a supplementary heat source, but according to the International Code Council, they cannot be the primary heat source.



When using these heaters, it is VERY important to follow all proper instructions. Do not use extension

cords when using electric heaters and be sure to keep a clear area around any supplemental heater as well.

Kerosene heaters should not be used in enclosed areas. Another heat source that should not be used in or under your home are the salamander or torpedo type heaters.

Remember not to overload your electrical circuits. If a breaker is tripping and keeps needing to be reset that is an indication there is an issue. If a breaker is tripping it is doing its job. If there is any question about your electrical system you should contact a licensed and insured electrician to come inspect your wiring. This could prevent tragedy or even save your life.

Following the topic of prevention, smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors are a must! Not only is it a good idea but it is also required by City code. All dwellings are required to have smoke detectors and any dwelling where natural gas is used for heating or cooking requires a carbon monoxide detector. If you rent your home or apartment the landlord is responsible to provide these safety measures. They MUST provide you with a smoke detector and/or carbon monoxide detector if you meet the criteria.



Finally, keep in mind that if you hire someone to work at your residence, make sure they are licensed with the State as well as with the City of Milton. The Holidays are over and hopefully everyone had a wonderful time entering the New Year.

The weather is supposed to be snowy and cold the next couple of months so stay warm and please watch out for your neighbors, especially the elderly. Make sure they have heat and something to eat. If you know of anyone who is having trouble coping with the elements, please contact us as there are agencies, organizations and churches who are willing to help if they are aware of this type of problem.

Travel may be treacherous at times if we get the snow they are forecasting this year. Please be prudent in your travels and do not take unnecessary risks. We will be out assisting anyone who runs into trouble on the roads.

I will remind everyone again, if you need the Milton Police Department or one of our officers, the quickest way to get us is to call 911 as we are dispatched through them. If you call our office, there is nobody there after 4:00 p.m. or over the weekend and you will get a voicemail. That may not be answered until the next day or Monday if you call over the weekend. Likewise, if you contact us on our Facebook Page through private messenger you need to be aware that the page is not monitored 24 hours a day and it could be several days before your message is even seen. As you can see, calling 911 is your best option if you need police assistance, even if it is not an emergency.

I would like to welcome our new City of Milton Municipal Judge Mike Meadows who will start in January. Court is held the 2nd Tuesday of each month and is open to the public

This was mentioned in the last issue but it is worth repeating: school bus laws. State Law as well as Municipal Code requires traffic traveling in either direction to stop for a loading or unloading school bus with flashing lights on two lane roads. **What many do not know is that State Law and Municipal Code requires the same on US Rt. 60 which is an undivided four lane highway with a turn lane (five lanes total) from John's Creek to Pine Haven Drive. Example: If you are traveling East on US Rt. 60 in the right hand lane and a westbound school bus stops and activates its lights in the opposite right hand lane YOU ARE TO STOP even though there are three lanes between you.**

Every year there is confusion about this law. When laws are made regarding the safety of our children you can be sure they will be strictly enforced by our department.

Stay safe, watch out for one another and be kind to whoever you meet.

From the Utilities :

Happy New Year from everyone here at Milton Utilities! We hope your holidays were filled with joy and good cheer!

Winter brings freezing temperatures that can wreak havoc on your plumbing. Follow these tips to help avoid leaks and/or breaks in your pipes.

- Insulate pipes with insulation sleeves, wrapping or using slip-on foam pipe insulation. Do not leave gaps without insulation as cold air can affect the pipe in these spaces. Plastic piping is more tolerant of freezing than old copper or steel water pipes.
- Inspect the exterior of the property, making sure that all visible cracks are sealed using caulk or spray foam to fill the voids. Cold air can enter through the unsealed cracks causing your pipes to freeze.
- Maintain a safe heating source inside the home to protect pipes against cold.
- It is a good idea to leave a faucet dripping, allowing water to move freely and continuously, preventing it from freezing.
- Make sure the crawl space is properly insulated. Block vents that lead outside with cardboard or wood.
- Don't forget the hose bibs. Hose bibs left unattended can burst in freezing weather. Drain hose bibs and insulate with covers. Once this has been completed, deactivate bibs at the shutoff valve.

Our after-hours call service is now up and running. If you experience a water or sewer emergency outside of our regular business hours, call 1-855-212-8272. The information you provide will be given to a utilities employee, who will then determine the next course of action.

We look forward to 2020 being a GREAT year for us. We have BIG goals set for 2020, such as repairing our concrete pad in front of the bay area, obtaining funding to replace our 1990 fire truck and working on the rear parking area. We are also seeking funding assistance to expand and renovate our Barker Ridge station.



We have applied for several years to obtain funding to purchase a ladder truck which would be used on all emergency responses for both residential and commercial buildings over two stories high. Unfortunately, we have been denied each time. We will continue to work hard to achieve this much-needed apparatus. It will not only provide operational assistance, but with all the infrastructure being built in our area, it will be a necessity in order to keep our ISO rating low. Providing class A quality fire protection to our community is our goal and we will continue to work hard to obtain the equipment needed to achieve

this goal.

Floodplain & Stormwater News by Randy Rutledge

Winter Stormwater Tips

Here are some environmentally friendly tips for dealing with winter ice and snow on driveways and walkways:

- Shovel early. The more snow and ice you remove, the less salt you will have to use and the more effective it can be.
- More salt does not mean more melting. Apply appropriately; salt takes time to work. Consider buying a hand-held spreader to help apply a consistent amount.
- Fifteen degrees Fahrenheit is too cold for salt. Most salts stop working at this temperature. Use a traction agent as needed but remember they do not melt ice.
- Sweep up excess. Salt or sand on dry pavement is no longer doing any work, sweep it up before it is washed away and apply less the next time.
- Try an alternative for traction. Sand and kitty litter are effective but can clog sewers and degrade stream habitat when washed away. Cracked corn can be an alternative to try in a pinch that is more environmentally friendly. I have tried this, and it works fine but will attract every pigeon in the neighborhood. You have been warned!
- Understand what's in it. All deicers will melt the ice, but some have less of an impact on the environment. Instead of sodium chloride or calcium chloride use products containing an acetate, potassium chloride, or magnesium chloride.



In closing I'd like to talk about clogged storm drains and flooding. In the past we have had some flooding which was traced to drains and pipes clogged with leaves. Our street sweeper has been active in removing leaves from the streets and curbs, but it has now been shut down for the winter. I ask you to please check and clean the ones around your property. By working together, we can reduce the flooding which damages our homes and property.

Floodplain News

Who is responsible for flood risk? Unfortunately, many people and communities think the federal government should solve the flooding issue, including protecting them from flood losses and potential loss of life. WRONG! Think about it – the primary factors that increase flood risk are where and how we build. The main tool for managing how and where we build is building codes. Who has authority for codes? We all know that the answer is local and state governments, not the federal government. The federal government has no authority in these areas. The NFIP does require local communities and states to do zoning and/or codes if they want to participate in the NFIP so their citizens can buy flood insurance. Therefore, local communities and states must manage development and mitigation to reduce flood losses. Progressive communities understand and use these tools effectively. If we don't do our job all our residents and businesses could see an increase in what they pay for their flood insurance. That is something we all hope to avoid.



An update on our floodwall. You have no doubt seen various crews in town surveying and doing whatnot. The floodwall project is moving forward. It will happen! We have meetings with the Army Corps of Engineers on a regular basis. These meetings are mostly informational and for ironing out the details of their project. The USACE oversees holding meetings with the public and will set them up as needed. We will announce such meetings on our various media sites.
