tion to these new businesses, Putnam County Bank is purchasing the property where the old Chase Bank building was located. This will give locals another option for their banking needs, and for those who already bank with PCB, they will have their bank closer to home. We welcome these new businesses, and wish them great success.

I'm glad to see sunny skies and warmer weather. Now that spring is here, we can park the salt trucks and get the mowers ready for grass-cutting season.

There is a lot of terrain to cover, and our street employees do a great job of keeping the City looking nice. The familiar burst of color from the hanging flower baskets will be arriving mid-May. We get so many compliments on the City's beautification efforts both from residents and visitors alike. Milton is a lovely place to call home, and ensuring that it is an inviting area is important. The small investment of beautification makes for an appealing city, which can pay for itself by attracting new businesses and consumers. And,



perhaps more importantly, it stimulates residents' pride in their City and boosts their property's value.

If you've traveled Florida Street past the Cemetery, you've probably noticed that a large portion of old chain-link and barbed wire fence is being replaced by a beautiful wrought-iron fence to surround our loved ones' final resting place. I'm grateful for funding received through the Home Rule program which allow us to make these repairs, one road at a time.

From the Director of Public Works Charles Conard



There is a lot going on in Milton. Spring clean-up went well and we are happy to provide this service to our residents. I do ask that when items are set out for City clean-ups, please bag small items, and keep the weight of each bag to less than 50 pounds. Our employees work hard and do a great job; we don't want them to suffer injury due to very heavy loads.

Paving, curbs and sidewalks on Harrison from Pike to Smith Streets is complete. Soon we will continue this process on Harrison from Smith to Glenwood Street. I know this is a hassle for those who live on or travel these streets, but this inconvenience doesn't last forever, and it sure is nice once finished.

Two sides of the old chain-link/barbed wire fence were removed surrounding the cemetery, and a new, wrought-iron fence is taking its place. It's going to look much nicer than the old fence, and I can't wait to see the final result.

I want to address complaints received recently about discolored water. As required by law, we have been testing and flushing fire hydrants to assure that a reliable water supply and distribution system is available in the event of a fire. The testing process involves flowing water from each hydrant, which stirs up the sediment in the water mains and may cause discolored water to flow into homes and businesses. Although sediment in the water may give tap water an

unpleasant appearance, it can be cleared by simply allowing the faucet to run until the water clears. This hydrant testing was publicized on our website, our Facebook page and the Milton Volunteer Fire Department Facebook page, but some did not see this notification. For that we apologize and will try other methods to notify you. As always, if you ran water to clear



sediment from your tap, call the office and we will credit your account for the excess usage, which can be determined accurately by the smart meters.

We are discussing how to use funding we should receive through the American Rescue Plan. Rules for its use should be available soon. We believe we will be able to replace water lines up Newman's Branch with this grant. Many large water leaks along that route have caused frustrating and costly problems in the past, and getting the funds to replace them is a big relief.

Already in progress is a project to replace the old, deep water lines near Wallace Funeral Home to a location closer to Route 60, and not nearly as deep! We have obtained bids for this job, after we get the final approval from the State, we will begin working on this project. Hopefully, we will be able to start soon before that water line leaks or breaks again.

What is the most important thing to remember when installing a smoke alarm or carbon monoxide alarm? Location, location, location!

Smoke Alarm Safety:


- Install at least one smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside of each sleeping room area, and on each level of a multi-level building
- Test each smoke alarm regularly
- Keep batteries fresh by replacing them when you change the time on your clocks in the spring and fall
- Check the manufacture date on your smoke alarm. Consider replacing it if it is over ten years old.

Smoke alarms can't help you unless they are functional and you can hear them. Building safety codes require smoke alarms.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Alarm Safety:

- Consider installing a CO alarm in the hallway outside of each sleeping room area
- Test each CO alarm regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions
- Permanently wired or plug-in CO alarms should have battery backup. Keep batteries fresh by replacing them when you change the time on your clocks in the spring and fall.

CO alarms can't help you unless they are functional and you can hear them. Building safety codes require CO alarms in all dwelling units that contain a fuel-fired appliance and dwelling units that have an attached garage.

Hello Friends,

We have finally been able to start holding our meetings and drills again for our membership and we have started to open our community room back up for rentals and functions. We continue to ask that proper COVID guidelines are followed when using our community room.

Since our last Miltonian, we have responded to over 112 emergency calls with three residential fires. Two of the residential fires were mutual aid responses with neighboring departments.

Our administration has been working diligently to replace apparatus that is over twenty years old. We have assembled a committee who continues to collect data and will be presenting our Board and membership with feedback as to how they feel we should proceed. There is a lot of work to determine the right apparatus for our community such as finding out the correct length and width of the apparatus, the correct pump size to the amount of water it needs to hold. Our committee has met with many vendors to come up with designs based on our need.

With that being said, we NEED your continued support to help us obtain the needed equipment such as fire apparatus, gear, training material and classes and our normal day to day operational expenses. Purchasing a fire truck isn't like purchasing a new car. The truck has to meet State and Federal guidelines on top of having a minimal amount of specific equipment on that truck. The cost of a fire truck ranges

from \$ 300,000.00 to \$ 800,000.00 and based upon the specific needs such as pump size, tank size, length, width, equipment and the operational roles that truck is designed to do, the cost can increase substantially.

We not only serve the City Limits of Milton we have the largest response district in Cabell County, and we are the only Volunteer fire department in Cabell County that maintains two fire stations, the one in the City of Milton and our Barker Ridge station. The City of Milton continues to grow with multi-million-dollar infrastructure being built such as our upcoming Grand Patrician Resort, the new Elementary School and the rehabilitation of many current buildings in town such as the old bank on Main Street, the apartment building on Smith Street and many more.

Our membership feels the same as I do, we cannot "sit on the back burner" if you will and watch everything around us grow and not maintain a growth within our department when it comes to training, personnel, and most importantly equipment. We have to meet not only the needs of our community, but the State and Federal mandates when it comes to training, personnel requirements and specific equipment and apparatus.



We are fortunate to have a great community support, and our membership works hard to not only maintain a proven high level of quality when it comes to our operational responsibilities, but they work diligently to keep up with the demands of fundraising and public services.

We met with the current City administration and discussed our need to grow as the community grows. We provided details as to our goals and needs in order to replace older and unreliable apparatus. We are very happy and we THANK them for listening and approving to increase the funding they provide to our department. We also spoke about things that our department and the City can do to improve our level of performance when it comes to firefighting and ISO ratings (International Organization for Standardization) which


raises or lowers your home owner's insurance. The City hired a qualified company to come in and inspect and conduct flow rates for every fire hydrant. This is critical for not only our firefighting operations but our evaluations from the State Fire Commission and ISO.

We had two members receive Excellence in Bravery Awards from the State Fire Commission for their life saving actions at a residential fire we responded to in February of this year. Sgt. Dakota Miller and FF Billy Conway were presented with the awards at this past State Fire Commission meeting. CONGRATS to both our members and we appreciate the hard work each and every one of our members does on a daily basis.

AN UPDATE FROM THE US ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS:

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, State of West Virginia, and City of Milton continue to progress the implementation of a flood risk management project for the City. Once complete, the project will significantly reduce flood related threats to the health, safety, and property of those within its limits. The project includes the design and construction of approximately 8,300 linear feet of earthen levee and floodwall to reduce the risk of flooding within Milton's central business district. The design is currently in its final stages of review and is anticipated to be complete by Summer 2021. The State of West Virginia and City of Milton are currently working to acquire the real estate needed to complete the project. Owners of properties impacted by the project will be contacted over the next several months and provided information regarding the extent of impact, the process that will be used for acquisitions, and who to contact with questions. Construction is expected to begin in Spring 2022 and be completed in 2024. Please send general inquiries regarding this flood wall project to MiltonFlood-Project@usace.army.mil.

Spring is in full swing and Summer is right around the corner. For those of you with swimming pools or those who plan to purchase a pool this summer, here is an explanation of our Pool Adjustment Policy. Of course, when you decide to fill your pool is completely up to you, but keep in mind that a pool adjustment will only be given for one billing cycle and will only be given once per calendar year. Meters are typically read on the 17th of each month, which is something you may consider when planning your pool fill so that you get the most benefit from your adjustment. The pool adjustment form can be found on our website under the utilities tab or can be picked up at our office. Please be aware that submission of this form does not relieve responsibility of payment and that those forms will be reviewed in September at our Water Board meeting. Adjustments granted will be reflected on your October bill.


United Daughters of the Confederacy Cooney Ricketts #2726 Milton

A local no-kill animal shelter named 'Little Victories' was recently overwhelmed when someone anonymously dropped off over 40 cats on their doorstep one night. This collection varied in ages from a few days old and upwards.

Normally, this shelter only handles about 35 cats at a time, so the unexpected arrival of 40 additional fur babies was a real financial and logistical crisis. Calls for help were published in the local media and our Chapter swiftly joined the efforts to provide the urgently needed assistance. Our members brought an assortment of donated cat and kitten food, as well as litter, and after the meeting we delivered the load directly to the shelter. We also voted to add 'Little Victories' shelter to the Chapter's ongoing benevolent causes.

With the COVID crisis beginning to ebb locally, and with the weather getting warmer every week, the entire Chapter is looking forward to a bright and active Spring and Summer.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN

You have likely heard that the City of Milton is slated to receive a grant through the American Rescue Plan. Milton was awarded \$1.05 million, based upon population. This funding must be used for specific purposes and within a set period of time, and we are waiting for detailed instructions for its use. The first half of this grant should be dispersed by the state some time in June, with a second payment being sent about twelve months later. Water and sewer infrastructure is one of the suggested uses for this grant. Two water infrastructure issues that currently need to be addressed are water line replacement and upgrading the filtration system at the water plant.

Water line replacement is something we consistently work on as leaks occur and funding allows. Leaks happen all the time, no matter which water company you have. The older the water line, the more likely it is to break. The first section of water lines that come to mind to replace is the long stretch of old water lines going out Newman's Branch that have caused so many problems in the past few years. We have had many large leaks along this route, and it definitely needs to be replaced. We believe the grant would likely cover the majority of the cost of replacing this section of water line.



Another possible use for these funds would be to convert the existing filtration system at the water plant to a more modern and efficient system, which would allow a higher volume of clean water to be produced. This project would likely cost around \$3,000,000.00, which is substantially more than the grant we should receive. However, there may be loans or matching grants available that could allow us to proceed with this conversion, and we are investigating those options. However these funds are utilitzed, we want to have a plan in place when the grant become available.

Aside from using the bulk of this grant for infrastructure, if approved, I would also like the City to donate a portion of it to two very deserving non-profit organizations that suffered from the restrictions enacted to minimize the spread of Covid-19: The Ona/Milton Little League and the Milton Volunteer Fire Department.



First, Covid-19's impact on the Ona/Milton Little League was not just on the economic bottom line, but also the social, physical and psychological impact on the kids who play youth sports. The reduction of children's physical activity, and the reported increased risk of anxiety and depression in children is worrisome. It is important to get these kids outside, actively engaged in physical activity.

For the Little League to offer this low-cost/free activity for children, they must raise money, in large part, through concessions and fundraisers, to pay for uniforms, equipment and tools for field maintenance and repair. They have been unable to do any fundraisers for over a year, and their lost revenue has been significant. In addition, recent flooding in Milton filled the concession building in Milton with mud and debris. Instead of a stationary concession structure they are considering purchasing a food truck so that, in the future, they can move the concessions in the event of flooding.

Thankfully, the Ona/Milton Little League has resumed practicing and playing ball this spring. It's great to see the kids outside enjoying America's pastime again. I'm hopeful that we can help them recoup some of their lost revenue. Aside from money, they need our support. Not just the City's support, but the entire community's. Go watch a game, walk around the fields, cheer on our children. Let them know their community is behind them.

Second, the Milton Volunteer Fire Department lost revenue normally earned by boot drives, building rentals, ticket sales to events like wrestling and concerts, and sales of concessions at these events. The MVFD uses the money from these events to purchase equipment, including personal protection equipment and vehicles. Right now, they need to purchase or lease two different fire trucks: a ladder truck and a 1500 GPM capable firetruck. The ladder truck is necessary for use on buildings more than two stories high, such as schools, the nursing home, apartment buildings, all of main street and most structures that will be at the Grand Patrician Resort to name a few. Currently, they must either use the equipment they have available, or wait for a ladder truck to arrive from Barboursville. This delay could mean the difference between saving a life or losing one. They also need a fire truck with a minimum of 1500 GPM pump to bring them into full compliance with commercial structures with sprinkler systems. This larger GPM pump truck will help with their ISO rating which, in turn, could lower the cost of fire insurance for residential and commercial structures.



The City of Milton is growing; we expect our population to double in the next few years. We cannot afford to let the Milton Volunteer Fire Department fall into disrepair or be forced to utilize inadequate, faulty or obsolete equipment. They must have the tools necessary to effectively do their job. Anything less puts them and the community in danger. The income that would have been generated by fundraisers over the past year may not have purchased a new firetruck that costs around \$1,000,000.00, but it would have helped. If permitted, a contribution from the City to recoup their lost revenue would help them a great deal as they again begin efforts to raise money to pay for the service they provide voluntarily. Again, help us support our local fire department. They risk their lives responding to emergency situations. Let's give back and let them know how much we appreciate them

Once we receive the Federal Government's guidelines for the appropriate and eligible use of these funds, we will be in a better position to decide which projects we should pursue. Be sure to check our website and Facebook page for updates.



Under the American Rescue Plan, the City of Milton has been awarded approximately \$1.05 million to be used on approved projects. We have not received detailed instructions regarding how this funding can be used, although they did provide preliminary guidelines indicating that water and sewer infrastructure was an area that would be approved. For more information on the ARP and our initial proposals for using it, see my article on Page 7.
